Colorado is not noted for any large settlement of the Cory/Corey family so there are slim pickings for researchers (but has that ever stopped us from discussing our ancestry?)

We want this year's reunion to be an event the whole family can enjoy (both young and old). Bring your family and enjoy a vacation in the Rockies. Here is a sampling of what we have to look forward to. Remember, this is just a preliminary, and not a final, so there may be some changes ahead.

Friday, August 15th

Day long guided bus tour of Anasazi archeological sites at Mesa Verde National Park. Tour includes box lunch at Mesa Verde. Park is 36 miles from Inn. The charge including the box lunch will be \$45/person.

Saturday, August 16th

Journey to Silverton on narrow gauge railroad. This is a historical railroad using coaches built in 1880. The route traverses some of the most spectacular scenery in North America. We depart Durango at 8:30 AM and arrive Silverton

at 11:55 AM. We depart Silverton at 2:00 PM and arrive Durango at 5:25 PM. The train station is one block from our Inn, and the round trip is about 90 miles.

There will be time for lunch in Silverton as well as for a walking tour of this picturesque mining town. The train ticket is \$42.70 and does not include lunch. Children under 12 are half price — no charge for children not occupying a separate seat on coach.

Sunday, August 17th

Banquet and meeting at the Best Western Rio Grande Inn. Dinners will be approximately \$26.00.

Transportation

Durango may be reached most conveniently by car or air. The trip by car can be very interesting as the route from any direction passes through spectacular scenery.

The easiest access to Durango is by air to the La Plata County Airport, 18 miles from Durango, where free transportation to the Best Western Rio Grande Inn can be arranged. Flights to the local airport can be obtained from Denver, Colorado Springs, Dallas, Phoenix, Los Angeles, Las Vegas, or Albuquerque. Bus trans-

MYSTERY SOLVED!

Several years ago, the Cory Family Society was given a copy of an unidentified handwritten manuscript of the descendants of William Cory of Portsmouth. A letter written by Edwin Francis Corey has been found in the papers of Louise Prosser Bates at the Rhode Island Historical Library in Providence, RI. Comparison of the handwriting leaves no doubt that both are written by Edwin Francis Corey. 1918 was the latest date found in the book making it a later version of the Boston Transcript data. While the data is essentially identical, there are additions and corrections included in the book.

Family News

Deaths

Rev. David Munroe Cory¹⁰, age 93, died in the middle of Dec. 1996 in New York of pneumonia. He was the son of David Maggie⁹ and Louise (Treacy) Cory (David Magie⁸, Joseph⁷, Mulford⁶, Benjamine⁵, Joseph⁴, John^{3,2,1}. In the 1930's he learned to speak the Mohawk-Oneida language in order to include the Indian ironworkers during the construction of the Triborough Bridge, in his ministry. He was the author of "Within Two Worlds," a book about American Indians. Rev. Cory was also president of the Long Island Historical Society.

Evelyn Mills Cory died 25 Dec 1995, just 16 days before her 107th birthday. Miss Mills lived in South Carolina and was a teacher and a painter. She was a descendant of Capt. Philip Cory of Tiverton, RI, a Revolutionary War Captain.

Libby (Hodgkiss) Beaumont of Jamestown, RI, passed away suddenly on 21 Aug 1996. She wasa cousin of Evelyn Mills Cory (above) and also a descendant of Capt. Philip Cory.

History and Genealogy

"Rev Youngs had grown up in Southwold, County of Suffolk, England where his father was the minister of St. Edmunds and so the new town and county took their names from his roots in England."

First Presbyterian Church of Southold, Long Island, New York

In 1640 the Reverend John Youngs arrived on the north fork of Long Island with a boat load of Separatist Puritans. Rev Youngs had grown up in Southwold, County of Suffolk, England where his father was the minister of St. Edmunds and so the new town and county took their names from his roots in England. The first church was built soon after on the ground where the present Founders Monument now stands and was probably a simple log cabin with a dirt floor, no heat and rough benches to sit on. Forty years later a second church was built across the road on

the north side of the present sanctuary which was built in 1803.

In 1784 the church became the first on Long Island to be incorporated under the laws of New York and was called "The First Church, Congregation or Society of Southold." First Church united with the Presbytery of Long Island in 1832, there had been an informal relationship with the Presbyterian Church before then. It was renamed "The First Presbyterian

Church of Southold." The parsonage was

built in 1835 and the Christian Education wing was added in 1951.

Off the front of the sanctuary is the Founders Room containing memorabilia from the early days of the church as well as items linking them with St. Edmunds in Southwold, England who sent a stained glass window made from the broken glass of their stained glass windows shattered by German bombs during W.W.II. Another window is a creation of local artists to celebrate the 350th anniversary of the town and church.

Two of the church's past ministers are especially noteworthy. The Rev. James Davenport (served 1738-1746) was a major but controversial figure in the Great Awakening that shook the colonial churches in the 1740's. Also the Rev. Epher Whitaker (served 1851-1892) who was an intrepid and tireless pastor, scholar and town historian.

Is this your Ancestor?

Found in the 1850 census for Ohio, one William Corey, 35, who listed his occupation as "Whiskey sucker!"

Southold First Presbyterian Church Cemetary

"Here Lyeth the body of Mary Cory who died December 24th 1721 in the 30th year of her age."

"Here lies interred the body of DAVID COREY Esq. who departed this life October 10th A.D. 1758 Aged 68 years, 7 months and 4 days."



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

Accommodations

Rooms at the Best Western Rio Grande Inn are deluxe. Suites are available that hold 4 to 6 people, 36 of which are equipped with a small refrigerator and microwave oven. he location is ideal—near good restaurants and other places of interest along Main street, most of which can be reached by a free trolley that runs every 30 minutes. Transportation to and from the La Plata County Airport is included in the room charges, as is a deluxe continental breakfast.

Charges

\$115/day for a couple + tax

\$135/day for a 2 room suite + tax + \$10 for roll away if needed.

We have reserved a block of 15 rooms to obtain a group discount. Reservations made after July 14th will not receive the group discount.

Alternative Activities

There are other interesting activities that may appeal to those who might find the trip to Silverton on the narrow gauge railroad tiring (or alarming). Silverton is at an elevation of 9,500 feet, and the route passes through narrow gorges with shear drops of several thousand feet at the side of the track in places. There may be a problem for those sensitive to heights. One can arrange a guided walking and trolley tour, including a western museum, factory outlet stores, and western art galleries.

Suggested Attire

Durango has a semi-desert climate, with cool evenings during August and normally bright sunny days with warm afternoons. The high altitude (plus usually minimal cloud cover) results in high radiation and large diurnal fluctuations in temperature. Visitors should be dressed to accommodate substantial changes in temperature. Dark clothes are recommended for the train trip, as the cars are pulled by a coal burning engine. Soot may reach the passenger cars at times. More important than protection from temperature fluctuations is protection of eyes from radiation injury — sunglasses are a necessity. Lotions to protect exposed skin from sunburn is also advised for those who come from humid areas. he cool air often fools visitors unaccustomed to high altitudes, so they often fail to protect themselves soon enough to avoid eye or skin damage.
