1991 REUNION

The National Cory Family Society is having their reunion this year in Beaver County Pennsylvania. The headquarters will be at the Holiday Inn, in Beaver Falls. That is off Highway 18 North from the PA Turnpike Exit #2. If you plan to attend and come in by air, come to the Pittsburgh airport. That is about 30 miles south, you may catch a cab or rent a car there. Information on page seven. is form to make your a reservations to the hotel on page five. This should reach the hotel no later than the 22nd of July 1991. That is your responsibility. Also on page five is the form to send to Marge Chilson, the Chairman, for the banquet and trips, which by the way is now late but hopefully she can still accommodate you, call her.

Marge tells me that a Copy of Excerpts, copied from the GRATE BOOK, and other historical papers, bound in a vinyl spiral bound book will be available to you at the reunion for \$6.50 if ordered ahead of time. She will take orders for later delivery for \$10.00. if she has to send it to you.

The Reunion this year will be in the area that Elnathan Cory settled in, in the year 1797. He had fifteen children and most of then settled and raised their families in and around this area. Therefore many of you have your roots there and will probably will want to stay for a while to research. I'm sure your local cousins will assist.

For your information and assistance in your Research: Beaver county was created in 1800 from Cumberland County.

Cumberland County was created in 1750 from Lancaster County. The County Clerk of Beaver county has birth records from 1893 to 1907, death records from 1834, burial records from 1852 & 1893 to 1907, Marriage records 1885 to 1906 and some divorce records. Up to 1906 all these record were kept in the Counties, since then they have been under the direction of the division of Vital Statistics, PO Box 1528 New Castle PA 16103. The Marriage licenses are kept at the county clerks office. There has been a county history book published about county. From 1936 thru 1943 an inventory of the public records was made by the WPA, this is available. Beaver county a Genealogical Society, Historical research office is located 699 5th St. Beaver PA 15009. The Historical Museum Pennsylvania Harrisburg Commission of has been microfilming early wills, orphan's court, deed and tax records of PA counties. The Division of Public records holds these records but have no staff to research for you. There are however microfilm readers available for you to use. If you are doing research and looking for material in an area known as the Wyoming Valley, you will have to do your looking in Hartford Connecticut. In 1778 this section was an incorporated county in the colony of Connecticut. There was the Pennamite-Yankee War between the Colonist of Connecticut and Pennsylvania. In 1782 the dispute was settled by a decree known as the Decree of Trenton. From that time on the record would have been in Pennsylvania.

PROFILES

Francis McGuire Cory son of Aaron and Elizabeth (McGuire) Cory, born 13 August 1818 in New Philadelphia Tuscarawas Co., Ohio. He married Isabelle Hitchcock, who was the daughter of Isaac and Mary (Haverfield) Hitchcock. He was raised on the Cory farm in Crawford Co., Ohio until his marriage Isabelle, February 8th 1838. That year he and his bride move to Harden Co., Ohio to settle down on a farm and raise Their family. Francis was a justice of peace in Harden Co. in 1940. In the spring of 1854, Francis, Isabelle and seven sons pulled up stakes and started west. They had one wagon with two yoke of oxen to carry all there worldly goods. They traveled in stages, hunting fishing and with seven boys plenty of exploring. It is written that Isabelle could handle a team of oxen and rough it with the best of the pioneers. They crossed the Mississippi river at or near Clinton Iowa on the 4th of July 1854. they camped near Anamosa, Iowa and waited six weeks for other families and friends who Were also preparing to settle in the new lands. On the 4th day of September 1854 the five families arrived and made camp at the big spring east of where Sac City, Sac Co., Iowa now stands. These families comprised the only white residents in that area during the winter of 1854 and 1855. The Sunday following arrival, their Isabelle crossed the river (now called the Coon River), climbed the hill to a site over looking the valley below. She knelt in prayer and ask God to send his gospel and plant his

church in this new land. To day in that same spot. now stands the present Methodist Church. From the camp at big spring the men scattered out to stake their claims. Francis located his claim near what is now the present Cory Grove Cemetery, donated Ъy him. He immediately built a small log cabin; every stick and stone went into the construction of the cabin and out buildings was hewn out by hand with the material found on his land. The furniture made Ъy hand branches and boards smoothed by the adz. The first winter was mild or the settlers would not have survived. The game was plentiful, they ate boiled corn, wheat and the wild fruits and berries that had been preserved during their travels during the summer. The Sioux Indians were friendly and at times hunted with the white men. After the hunt there would always be a shooting match for the game killed, the white men always making it a point to win, to show the Indians how much better marksmen they were over the Indians. This is the same band of Indians headed up by Inkapadoto that was famous for the later depredations along the Sioux River and massacred people the Spirit Lake, Iowa. Francis was among the first members of the Grand Jury to receive a warrant. He was elected County Treasurer, 7 April 1856. Francis's boys grew up in a natural environment for hunting, trapping and fishing. Beaver dams were plentiful, deer and elk roamed the prairies and all through the timber was wolf,

fox, raccoons and just about any animal young boys wanted to hunt. The Cory boys had a team of trained elk which were great pets. The boys, during their idle moments, trained the team to harness. They were sensible and as easily driven as a team of horses. It is recorded that the boys father (Francis) sold this team of elk to a wandering trader for one hundred dollars. Not having the necessary cash on him he gave Francis a check for the amount on a Des Moines bank. Francis needing money set out on horse back at once for Des Moines to cash the check. Know what! the bank failed in the mean time, he never got his money. The Children of Francis and Isabelle; Isaac Alanson b 23 Dec 1838, m Sarah Jane Austin, William E 12 Dec 1840 m Sarah Tiberghin, Hugh McGuire b 11 Jan 1844 m Alice LaGourge, Harvey Wilson b 12 July 1846 m Mary Ellen Hagood, George Ingman b 11 Nov 1848 m Florence Helen Whitney, Joseph H b 9 April 1851 m Martha Bancroft, John Quigley b 4 Sep 1853 m Alice Brasius. Frances Isabelle b 16 Mar 1856 (first white girl born Sac county) m J Tiberghin and Abner Francis who died when he was about ten. Francis died 21 October 1865 and is buried at the Cory Grove cemetery in Sac County Iowa. Isabelle married John Miller and stayed on the farm until their retirement. After the Civil War his son Hugh took over the farm and there raised his family.

A NEW BOOK COMING OUT

Rev Jack Cory, our vice president and host for the 1990 reunion has asked for space to run an inquiry as to the interest of purchasing a book "THE AMERICAN CORYS" by Vernon and Michael Cory. Mr. Vernon and Michael Cory, of England, have been doing research for about 15 years on the Cory family in England and the migration to America, even before it was United States. They now are ready to publish their book, of about 100 8 X 11 pages complete with maps and diagrams and narrative of the Cory Centers of population in England, dating back to the Chori village, named in the Doomsday book of 1086 (now out of print). They say they have many corrections to the Harry Harman book, and some new information on the Great Cory village in Cornwall. They also trace the Corys to America, and show migration patterns of Corys as they moved from East Westward. They have data mainly on the Families of John, William, Thomas and Giles Cory, but also some data on Corys who arrived later to America, too.
