The 1991 National CORY Pamily Society Reunion, was a huge success as we all gathered in Beaver County Pa. August 9,10 and 11th, to renew our family ties. Many thanks goes out to H. Marge Chilson, Larry Mahon, Ruth Sanders and Barbara McCowin who made the weekend possible through their many hours of preparation. The reunion began on Friday afternoon as all the cousins began to gather and visit in the Cory hospitality room to renew or make new friendships. Saturday Morning came early as we loaded in the bus for a day of genealogy, history and sightseeing. Our first stop was Boon Valley Inn, where Larry Mahon presented us with coffee, doughnuts, rolls and a slide presentation on local Cory history. It was then off to the farm presently owned by Dr and Mrs DeJesus, that was the original farm of Blnathan Cory in late 1700 and early 1800. We were given a tour of "brick house", built by Blnathan's son John in 1824. From there we went to Darlington and to the famous and to the Greersburg Academy to view Cory Pamily memorabilia. On display was the famous "Grate Book", the Cory Bell, early Cory letters, research, land deeds, etc.. Our next stop was the Wilson Cemetery, where Blnathan and his wife Sarah Walker Cory are buried, as well as many of their descendants. After a well deserved stop for lunch at the Bnon Valley Inn we traveled to the Little Beaver Cemetery where George Washington Cory and other family members are buried. From there the gang visited an Amish cheese factory and a gift

shop. We then were guest at Honey Creek Parms, a restored farm house and farm where we were given a tour of the house, "1800 era". Wonderful refreshments followed the tour. Our next stop was the Little Beaver Historical museum in Darlington. We were shown artifacts of the local area, an area that was settled long ago by Blnathan and his many descendants. When the bus returned us to our reunion headquarters, The Beaver Palls Holiday Inn, we were ready for a little R an R. However that didn't stop many cousins from organizing a bridge game and to gather and visit in the hospitality room that evening. Next morning a few brave souls gathered in front of the Holiday Inn to be taken to the Darlington Mt. Pleasant Presbyterian Church for services. The Mt Pleasant Church was founded in 1797. Bluathan Cory was listed as being on the board of trustees in the early days of the Church. The Cory group was recognized by the minister during the service as being an early founding family of the Church. After returning to the hotel little time was left before we were to gather for our banquet and business meeting, which was held in the Beaver Falls Holiday Inn. First order of business was calling the meeting to order with the "Cory Bell", rung by local reunion president, Bill Cory. After the minutes were read and the officer's reports were finished we were reminded that the 1992 National Cory Pamily Reunion will be held in Salem, Massachusetts, August 8,9 and 18th 1992. The reunion will be hosted by Helen Mercier and her



I have been ask many times about the Sir Francis Drake connection with the Cory Families. Here is what I've found: Thomas Drake (Youngest Brother of Sir Francis Drake) married Elizabeth Aregore, and had one son named Francis, who became the first Baronet. Francis first marriage produced no issue. He then married Joanne Stroud and they had five sons. John, the third child was born 28 July 1610. He married and had six children. John the first was born in England ca 1657, he married Hannah Moore in America, 30 November 1692, they had five children. John the first child of John and Hannah was born at Windsor CT September 15, 1694. He married Elizabeth Bissell, 14 April 1723, they had two daughters, Elizabeth, born 5 March 1724, Married first William Corey son of John Corey of North Kingston RI on the 3rd of April 1742. They had two sons. Her first husband died in 1746. Elizabeth then married Thomas Corey, the brother of her first husband William, on 15 February 1748 and to them were born four children and so forth and so forth. Please do not let any one sell you a map or a promise of a stake in the Sir Francis Drake fortune that is supposed to buried in England.

About a year ago in the News letter I reported on Sylva Cory's 90th birthday and that her five sons, Grand kids, Great grand kids and Great Great grand kids all came to help her celebrate. Our family gathered again for a sadder occasion, My mother died July 26, 1991. She is now with my Father. When we visited her during her 90th birth day she gave me a poem, and I'd like to share it with you:

Do not stand at my grave and weep, I am not there, I do not sleep. I am the thousand winds that blow; I am the diamond glints on snow. MILLER-CORY HOUSE MUSEUM

The Miller-Cory house was a home to the

Millers when they built the house in 1740. They sold it to Joseph Cory early 1780's. The home was in the Cory family until 1923 when it was bought by George Burrows. The Westfield Historical Society acquired the property March 20, 1972. Today, the Miller-Cory House is a Nationally recognized "living museum." Each visitors are introduced to an endless variety of colonial skills as trained artisans recreate the every day life, the crafts and task of the 18th and early 19th century family. Starting next quarter I will start a series of articles on this Cory historical site. This museum is our heritage. You don't want to miss any issues.

HISTORICAL TIDBITS for the researcher

IDAHO

The capital of Idaho is Boise. It was made a Territory in 1863, a state in 1890, and was the last state to be carved out of the Oregon Territory. When Idaho became a territory on the 3rd of March 1863, it included all of Montana and nearly all of Wyoming. Montana became a territory in 1864 and Wyoming in 1868. The six original counties of Idaho were formed between 1861 and 1865. Idaho was admitted as a state the 3rd of July 1890, the forty third state of the Union.

The southern part of the state, which borders Utah was the first section to be settled starting about 1860. Mormon emigrants from northern Europe were the first to establish permanent settlements in the region.

A mining boom in 1860 attracted people from the east and midwest to the mountainous Idaho valleys. The later construction of large irrigation systems and districts around the long Snake River section about 1910 brought many western and midwestern families to take advantage of the farming in the new state.

If you are looking for marriage licenses, none was required prior to 11 March 1895. The county recorder will have them in his county after that date; he also has the land transactions. The Bureau of Vital Statistics, Statehouse Boise has information on births and deaths from 1 July 1911; marriages and divorces since 1947. The county clerk will have Birth records of his county between January 1907 and July 1911. Wills and probate will be filed with the county clerk.

ILLINOIS

The Illinois State capital is Springfield, It was an American Territory in 1787, a Territory in 1809 and a State in 1818, the 21st. Illinois was visited by French explorers in the late 1600's. Its fertile lands appealed to members various expeditions passing through during their exploring, hunting, or war activities.

Illinois was part of the Northwest Territory which United States obtained after the Revolutionary war from Great Britain to whom had been ceded by France in 1763. It became part of the United States in 1783. It was organized as an American Territory in 1787. It included the land north and west of the Ohio River, east of the Mississippi, and of south Canada. Illinois became the third of five territories and eventual states formed from that area. That was in 1818.

St.

Clair became the first county organized in the Ilinois Territory, that was in 1790. It extended along the Kaskskia River. Five years later Randolph County formed. situated farther south along the Kaskaskia and the Mississippi rivers. Farther east, along the Wabash River, Edwards County, the third Illinois county, came in to existence in 1814. And north of that county. Clark county, also along the Wabash, was formed in 1819. Those four counties were the forerunners of 102 counties that make up Illinois to day, the last were Ford and Jefferson counties in 1859.

Marriage records are in the sole custody of the county clerks. Birth and deaths from 1877 to 1916 were registered (if at all) by the county clerks. In a few counties there are some records existing prior to 1877.

NEVADA

Capital, Carson City - Territory 1861 - state 1864-36th.

Apparently the first whites to enter Nevada arrived in the mid-1820's. Kit Carson, John Freemont and others explored much of Nevada. During the 1849 gold rush, numerous wagon trains rumbled through on their way to California.

After the Mexican war, the region was ceded to the U.S. (1848), and in 1850 most of present day Nevada was included in the new Utah Territory. Genoa (formerly Mormon Station) was the first permanent settlement in 1851.

Twelve years after the Mormons reached the Great Salt Lake, gold and silver was found in the Comstock Mine in Virginia City about half way between Reno and Carson City. The strike was rich enough to turn the California rush east ward. The population of Nevada doubled over and over again. This strike attracted people sections all over Europe, from Britain, Italy. Germany and France. Many Mexicans also returned. Birth and death records from 1887 to 30 June 1911,
